



Criteria for the compilation of

Judges Lists

in accordance with recommendations by The Kennel Club Judges Working Party.

A1 List

For persons who have previously been approved by The Kennel Club to award CCs in the breed and have the support of the club.

A2 List

For persons who fulfil all the requirements of the A3 list and who have been assessed in accordance with Kennel Club requirements and are accepted by The Kennel Club for inclusion on an A2 List and have the support of the Club.

A3 List (Breed Specialists)

Requirements

- 1 Minimum of 7 years judging experience in the breed (Afghans) and have the support of the Club.
- 2 To have judged at an Afghan Hound breed club open show or a 10 class or larger breed club supported Afghan Hound open show.
- 3 To have judged a minimum of 55 classes (Afghans).
4. To have judged a minimum of 165 dogs of the breed (Afghans).
- 5 To have bred and/or owned a minimum of 3 dogs, which have obtained entry in The Kennel Club Stud Book. In the case of owned dogs they must have been in the ownership of the applicant when they first obtained Stud Book entry.
- 6 To have attended a seminar given by a KC Accredited Trainer, and passed the relevant

examination on KC Regulations and Judging Procedures.

7 To have attended a seminar given by a KC Accredited Trainer on Conformation and Movement.

8 To have attended and passed a Hands-on Assessment delivered by a KC Accredited Trainer on Conformation and Movement.

9 To have attended at least 3 approved judging seminars in the breed and passed an assessment.

10 To have stewarded for a minimum period of 3 years and at 12 shows.

A3 List (Non Specialists)

Requirements

- 1 Minimum of 7 years judging experience in any one breed (to include 5 years judging experience in Afghans) and have the support of the Club.
- 2 To have judged at an Afghan Hound breed club open show or a 10 class or larger breed club supported Afghan Hound open show.
- 3 To have judged a minimum of 55 classes (Afghans).
- 4 To have judged a minimum of 165 dogs of the breed (Afghans).
- 5 To have bred and/or owned a minimum of 3 dogs, which have obtained entry in The Kennel Club Stud Book. In the case of owned dogs they must have been in the ownership of

the applicant when they first obtained Stud Book entry.

6 To have attended a seminar given by a KC Accredited Trainer, and passed the relevant examination on KC Regulations and Judging Procedures.

7 To have attended a seminar given by a KC Accredited Trainer on Conformation and Movement.

8 To have attended and passed a Hands-on Assessment delivered by a KC Accredited Trainer on Conformation and Movement.

9 To have attended at least 3 approved judging seminars in the breed and passed an Afghan Hound assessment.

10 To have stewarded for a minimum period of 3 years and at 12 shows.

11 To have awarded CCs in at least one other breed.

B List (Breed Specialists)

(Supported by the WAHC for judging any number of classes at Open Shows).

Requirements

1 To have 6 years experience owning and exhibiting in the breed and have the support of the Club.

2 To have judged 18 classes of the breed (Afghans).

3 To have judged a minimum of 50 dogs of the breed (Afghans).

4 To have attended at least 3 approved judging seminars for the breed and passed an assessment.

5 To have stewarded 20 classes of any breed.

B List (Non Specialists)

(Supported by the WAHC for judging any number of classes at Open Shows).

Requirements

1 Minimum 6 years experience in any one breed and have the support of the Club.

2 To have judged 18 classes of the breed (Afghans).

3 To have judged a minimum of 50 dogs of the breed (Afghans).

4 To have attended at least 3 approved Afghan Hound judging seminars for the breed and passed an Afghan Hound assessment.

5 To have stewarded 20 classes of any breed.

C List (Supported by the WAHC for judging up to 5 Afghan classes at Open Shows).

Requirements

1 To have 5 years experience owning and exhibiting in the breed (Afghans or other Breeds) and have the support of the Club.

2 To have stewarded not less than 12 classes of any breed.
